

**STATEWIDE SUMMARY RESULTS OF THE 2025 NEVADA
TOURISM, HOSPITALITY, ARTS, AND CULTURE RESIDENT
SENTIMENT SURVEY**

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1.0 Introduction and Overview

Overview

In late 2024, the Nevada Division of Tourism, along with the broader Nevada Department of Tourism and Cultural Affairs, contracted with the University Center for Economic Development, part of the College of Business at the University of Nevada, Reno, to assist in the development, implementation, and analysis of a statewide Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. In 2023, and according to the U.S. Census Bureau, the Arts, Entertainment, Recreation, and Accommodation and Food Services industry sector employed an estimated 297,753 total individuals statewide, responsible for approximately 20.2 percent of statewide total employment of approximately 1.5 million individuals currently employed across Nevada throughout various industry sectors. Comparatively, the Arts, Entertainment, Recreation, and Accommodation and Food Services industry sector accounted for just 8.8 percent of nationwide total employment across the entire United States.

This University Center for Economic Development presents a comprehensive summary of the statewide results of the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey, opened on December 7, 2024 and closed on March 14 2025. Section 2.0 of this University Center for Economic Development technical reports presents the statewide results of the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey for each individual section of the survey, including General Community Questions, General Sentiment towards Local Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture, Personal Engagement and Interaction with Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Activities, and Personal and Household Demographic Characteristics. Subsequent analysis of the results of the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey will utilize geographic segmentation and present corresponding socio-demographic, economic, and housing trends for each region used as part of this future geographic segmentation of the survey results.

2.0 Statewide Summary Results of the 2025 Nevada Resident Sentiment Survey

The 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey was opened on December 7, 2024 and closed on March 14, 2025, collecting a total of 2,096 individual responses, including both online surveys and hardcopy versions of the survey distributed and collected from across the state. The survey itself consisted of 38 individual questions divided into four separate sections:

- *General Community Questions*, Eight Total Questions
- *General Sentiment towards Local Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture*, 13 Total Questions
- *Personal Engagement and Interaction with Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Activities*, Seven Total Questions
- *Personal and Household Demographic Characteristics*, Ten Total Questions

This section presents a detailed overview of the statewide responses for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The results of the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey presented in this section are divided into the four separate sections used to develop and administer the survey.

2.1 General Community Questions Results

For Question No. 1, “Are you a resident of the state of Nevada for 6 or more months out of the year?”, a significant majority of survey respondents, 2,029 total survey respondents or 96.9 percent of the 2,095 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 1, answered ‘Yes’ and just 66 total survey respondents, or 3.2 percent, answered ‘No’. For Question No. 2, “If you answered ‘No’ to Question No. 1, indicating that you do not reside in the state of Nevada for 6 or more months out of the year, do you consider yourself a ‘Snowbird’, defined as someone who migrates from colder parts of North America to warmer southern locations, typically during the winter months?”, a significant majority of survey respondents, 412 total survey respondents or 97.9 percent of the 421 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 2, answered ‘No’ and just nine total survey respondents, or 2.1 percent, answered ‘No’.

Table 2.1 presents the results for Question No. 3, “Regardless of your answer to Question No. 1, how many years have you lived in Nevada either full-time or part-time?”, for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The top three results selected by survey respondents are highlighted.

Survey respondents that responded to Question No. 3 generally indicated that they have lived in the state of Nevada for a significantly long period of time, with 1,302 total survey respondents, or 62.2 percent of the 2,095 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 3, selecting ‘20 Years or More’. An additional 243 total survey respondents or 11.6 percent selected ‘Between 5 Years and less than 10 Years’ and an additional 206 total survey respondents or 9.8 percent selected ‘Between 1 Year and less than 5 Years’ as part of their response to Question No. 3.

Table 2.2 presents the results for Question No. 4, “Please write in your county and community of your primary residence (i.e. where you typically reside for 6 or more months out of the year), and the applicable zip code (for example, Nye County, Tonopah, 89049).”, for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The top five results selected by survey respondents are highlighted.

A total of 687 total survey respondents, or 33.0 percent of the 2,080 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 4, indicated that they currently live in Clark County, Nevada. An additional 489 total survey respondents, or 23.5 percent, indicated that they currently live in Washoe County, Nevada and an additional 283 total survey respondents, or 13.6 percent, indicated that they currently live in Carson City, Nevada. A combined 1,459 total survey respondents, or 70.1 percent, indicated that they live in one of Nevada’s three existing metropolitan counties, either Carson City (Carson City Metropolitan Statistical Area), Clark County (Las Vegas Metropolitan Statistical Area), or Washoe County (Reno-Sparks Metropolitan Statistical Area). In 2023, the estimated total population of these three counties, Carson City, Clark County, and Washoe County, according to the U.S. Census Bureau was an estimated 2.89 million total individuals compared to an estimated total population for the entire

state of Nevada of approximately 3.19 million total individuals. The combined total population of Carson City, Clark County, and Washoe County accounted for approximately 90.6 million of the state of Nevada’s total population in 2023.

Based on survey respondent results, an additional 186 total survey respondents, or 8.9 percent, indicated that they currently live in Lyon County, Nevada. In 2023, Lyon County’s total residential population was an estimated 62,583 total individuals according to the U.S. Census Bureau, representing Nevada’s third largest county in-terms of total population and accounting for approximately 2.0 percent of the statewide total population. An additional 152 total survey respondents, or 7.3 percent, indicated that they currently live in Douglas County, Nevada. In 2023, Douglas County’s total residential population was an estimated 49,545 total individuals according to the U.S. Census Bureau, accounting for approximately 1.6 percent of the statewide total population.

Table 2.3 presents the results for Question No. 5, “Please write in the county, community and the applicable zip code of your primary employment (for example, Nye County, Tonopah, 89049).”,

for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The top five results, excluding ‘Other/Unknown’, selected by survey respondents are highlighted.

Similar to the results for Question No. 4, most survey respondents, 1,327 total survey respondents or 73.9 percent of the 1,795 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 5, indicated that they currently work in either Carson City, Clark County, or Washoe County. A total of 535 total survey respondents or 29.8 percent indicated that they currently work in Clark County, Nevada, 467 total survey respondents or 26.0 percent indicated that they currently work in Carson City, Nevada, and an additional 325 total survey respondents or 18.1 percent indicated that they currently work in Washoe County, Nevada. An additional 55 total survey respondents, or 3.1 percent, indicated that they currently work in Douglas County, Nevada and an additional 52 total survey respondents, or 2.9 percent, indicated that they currently work in Lyon County, Nevada. Of the 142 total survey respondents, or 7.9 percent, that indicated a county, community, or Zip Code not located in Nevada, was unknown, or was some other answer, the majority of these survey respondents either indicated ‘N/A’, that they work remotely in the same county, community, or Zip Code where they currently live, or that they were retired.

Table 2.4 presents the results for Question No. 6, “How many years have you lived in the town, city, or community that you currently reside in (i.e. the town, city, or community you identified in Question No. 4):”, for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The top three results selected by survey respondents are highlighted.

Similar to the results from Question No. 3, survey respondents that responded to Question No. 6 generally indicated that they have lived in the town, city, or community that they currently reside in based on their answer to Question No. 4 for a significantly long period of time, with 868 total survey respondents, or 41.7 percent of the 2,084 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 6, selecting ‘20 Years or More’. An additional 370 total survey respondents or 17.8 percent selected ‘Between 1 Year and less than 5 Years’ and an additional 353 total survey respondents or 16.9 percent selected ‘Between 5 Years and less than 10 Years’.

Table 2.5 presents the results for Question No. 7, “What are the specific attributes that you enjoy about the town, city, or community that you primarily reside in? Select all that apply.”, for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The top eight results selected by survey respondents are highlighted.

A total of 1,261 survey respondents, or 60.5 percent of the 2,084 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 7, selected ‘Landscape/Natural Features’ and an additional 1,230 total survey respondents, or 59.0 percent, selected ‘Outdoor Recreation Activities’. The response ‘Pace of life’ was selected by 1,137 total survey respondents or by 54.6 percent and ‘Overall

'Safety of the Community' was selected by 1,010 total survey respondents or by 48.5 percent. An additional 986 total survey respondents or 47.3 percent selected 'Local Weather Conditions' as part of their response to Question No. 7, 879 total survey respondents or 42.2 percent selected 'Close Proximity to existing Family and Friends', and 854 total survey respondents or 41.0 percent selected 'Close Proximity and Access to Major Transportation Infrastructure (airport, freeway, highway, Interstate, etc.)'. The response 'Variety of Restaurants and Dining Options (away from home)' was selected by 836 total survey respondents or by 40.1 percent of respondents that responded to Question No. 7.

Figure 2.1 presents a word cloud summarizing the written in responses provided by survey respondents for 'Other, Please Specify:' for Question No. 7, "What are the specific attributes that you enjoy about the town, city, or community that you primarily reside in? Select all that apply." for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey.

Among the 242 total survey respondents that selected 'Other, Please Specify:' as part of their response to Question No. 7, survey respondents overwhelmingly noted that the strong sense of community where they live is a specific attribute that they enjoy about the town, city, or community that they currently live in. Survey respondents highlighted a strong feeling of belonging, shared identity, mutual support among residents, and a belief that the community meets their various needs and wants, either socially, emotionally, or practically. Other survey respondents, in noting that a strong sense of community exists where they currently live, noted a sense among community residents of closeness and warmth, fostering trust and empathy, and a

general level of personal safety, were each noted by several respondents that emphasized the rural non-metropolitan existing cultural heritage and identity of their community.

Table 2.6 presents the results for Question No. 8, “What are the primary challenges that the town, city, or community that you primarily reside in currently faces? Select all that apply.”, for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The top eight results selected by survey respondents are highlighted.

Issues related to the general lack of availability and cost of housing, the relatively high and rising cost of living, and the pressures of continued growth and development were the most common responses selected by survey respondents as part of their response to Question No. 8.

‘Affordability and Availability of Housing’ was the single largest response selected by survey respondents who responded to Question No. 8, with 1,361 total survey respondents or 66.0 percent of the 2,062 survey respondents that responded to this question selecting this response. An additional 1,168 total survey respondents or 56.6 percent selected ‘High Cost of Goods and Services (i.e. gas, groceries, retail services, etc.)’ and an additional 943 total survey respondents or 45.7 percent selected ‘High Traffic Levels/Congestion on Major Roadways and Transportation Corridors’. ‘Homelessness/Unhoused Population’ was selected by 826 total survey respondents, or by 40.1 percent, ‘Low Quality of Education (primary, Kindergarten through 12th Grade)’ was selected by 746 total survey respondents, or by 36.2 percent, and ‘Community is Developing Too Quickly/Too Much Building and/or Urban/Suburban Sprawl’ was selected by 713 total survey respondents, or by 34.6 percent. An additional 704 total survey respondents or 34.1 percent selected ‘Lack of Public Transportation Options’ and an additional 682 total survey respondents or 33.1 percent selected ‘Lack of Affordable and/or Available Healthcare Services (physical and mental, basic emergency to more advanced care such as hospitals)’.

Figure 2.2 presents a word cloud summarizing the written in responses provided by survey respondents for ‘Other, Please Specify:’ for Question No. 8, “What are the primary challenges that the town, city, or community that you primarily reside in currently faces? Select all that apply.” for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey.

Among the 270 total survey respondents that selected ‘Other, Please Specify:’ as part of their response to Question No. 8, survey respondents reiterated several of the challenges that their town, city, or community currently faces that were selected as prompted responses as part of Question No. 8, again focusing on several different growth pressures. Chief among these individual growth pressures identified by survey respondents was additional concern regarding the high cost and lack of availability of housing as well as the demands that continued community growth is having on critical public infrastructure. Survey respondents noted that it is becoming increasingly difficult to find acceptable quality owner-occupied and renter-occupied housing options in their community, even in the more rural non-metropolitan parts of the state. The continued lack of affordable and quality housing was attributed by many survey respondents to the continued migration of people from outside the state to Nevada and the inability of their local government to ensure that new owner-occupied and renter-occupied housing is built at a rate that would keep prices relatively affordable. Several survey respondents who noted the lack of affordable and quality housing as a primary community challenge also noted that they would like to see higher density in-fill development pursued and encouraged as part of their community’s answer to the state’s ongoing housing crisis as opposed to continued urban or suburban sprawl. Utilizing underutilized or vacant buildings and parcels in their community’s existing built environment for new owner-occupied and renter-occupied housing is preferable by many survey respondents as opposed to continued sprawl.

Survey respondents also noted that their community’s existing set of public infrastructure assets are becoming quickly overwhelmed because of continued community growth, including

not enough private sector businesses or retail services, a general lack of childcare and education services or generally poor childcare and education services, a lack of various types of healthcare services, and even not enough activities, entertainment options, or special events aimed at families with young children, teenagers, and even young adults as major community-level concerns. Again, this ‘lack of’ or ‘not enough of’ concern was largely associated with continued community-wide growth. In some cases, survey respondents attributed to this general ‘lack of’ or ‘not enough of’ concern to their community’s more rural non-metropolitan characteristic and their community’s own geographic isolation and distance from larger more urban and metropolitan communities. While survey respondents living in more rural non-metropolitan communities throughout the state noted that they would like their community to maintain its existing cultural heritage and identity as a rural community, they would like to see more amenities, private sector businesses, retail services, and special events and entertainment options developed in their community as opposed to having to drive long distances to other communities to access these amenities, services, options, and opportunities.

2.2 General Sentiment towards Local Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Results

Table 2.7 presents the results for Question No. 9, “Which of the following attributes of your community do you think the tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritage industries have positively contributed to your community? Select all that apply.”, for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The top eight results selected by survey respondents are highlighted.

‘Outdoor Recreation Activities’ was the most frequently selected response by survey respondents that responded to Question No. 9, selected by 800 total survey respondents or by 58.1 percent of the 1,378 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 9. An additional 593 total survey respondents, or 43.0 percent, selected ‘Availability and Access to Various Arts and Cultural Experiences (music concerts/festivals, art galleries, art museums, history museums, public art, visual/performance literary experiences, etc.)’ and an additional 580 total survey respondents, or 42.1 percent, selected ‘Friendly/Welcoming Atmosphere and People’. ‘Pace of Life’ was selected by 491 total survey respondents or by 35.6 percent, ‘Architectural Design/Visual Appeal of City/Town’ was selected by 453 total survey respondents or by 32.9 percent, and ‘Variety of Restaurants and Dining Options (away from home)’ was selected by 431 total survey respondents or by 31.3 percent. An additional 360 total survey respondents, or 26.1 percent, selected ‘Job/Career Opportunities’ and an additional 332 total survey respondents, or 24.1 percent, selected ‘Variety of Shopping, Stores, and Retail Options’ as part of their answer to Question No. 9.

Figure 2.3 presents a word cloud summarizing the written in responses provided by survey respondents for ‘Other, Please Specify:’ for Question No. 9, “Which of the following attributes of your community do you think the tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritage industries have positively contributed to your community? Select all that apply.” for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey.

For the 109 total survey respondents that selected ‘Other, Please Specify:’ and wrote in an answer as part of their response to Question No. 9, responses on other attributes that they think the tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritage industries have positively contributed to their community were somewhat mixed. A number of these survey respondents that selected ‘Other, Please Specify’ noted that tourism and hospitality, specifically, have not positively contributed to their community. Several survey respondents noted that increased tourism and hospitality has led to several community-wide challenges, ranging from increased traffic congestion on area roadways to increased costs on various goods and services to frustration over having to deal with periods of peak visitation to their community. These same survey respondents also noted that the tourism and hospitality industry sector in their community often creates only low pay and low skill jobs and does not generate enough meaningful public tax revenue to cover the costs associated with managing large numbers of tourists and visitors to their community. Of the 109 total survey respondents that provided a written answer to Question No. 9 as part of selecting ‘Other, Please Specify:’, at least 30 total survey respondents indicated that there was no positive impact at all.

Survey respondents who selected ‘Other, Please Specify:’ and provided a written response were more positive about the perceived impacts that the arts and cultural heritage industries have had on their community. Emphasis on the arts and cultural heritage has, in the opinion of several survey respondents, had a somewhat positive impact on different attributes of their community, ranging from additional special activities and events, new galleries, and increased opportunities to celebrate, preserve, and promote their community’s unique cultural heritage and identity. However, these same survey respondents noted that the arts and cultural heritage industries in their community are more oriented to serving existing residents and are often overlooked by

community and if increased investment directly into the tourism and hospitality resulted in the creation and attraction of new businesses and the retention and expansion of existing businesses that could close important ‘gaps’ in their community’s own economic base, that investment would be merited. However, these same survey respondents noted that increased investment in tourism and hospitality should not overshadow investment in the arts and cultural heritage industries.

Table 2.8 presents the results for Question No. 10, “Which of the following attributes of your community do you think the tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritage industries have negatively contributed to your community? Select all that apply.”, for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The top eight results selected by survey respondents are highlighted.

‘High Traffic Levels/Congestion on Major Roadways and Transportation Corridors’ was the most frequently selected response chosen by survey respondents who responded to Question No. 10, selected by 625 total survey respondents or by 50.1 percent of the 1,248 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 10. An additional 546 total survey respondents or 43.8 percent selected ‘High Cost of Goods and Services (i.e. gas, groceries, retail services, etc.) and an additional 529 total survey respondents or 42.4 percent selected ‘Affordability and Availability of Housing’. ‘Too Many People/Overcrowding’ was selected by 501 total survey respondents or by 40.1 percent, ‘Homelessness/Unhoused Population’ was selected by 450 total survey respondents or by 36.1 percent, and ‘Public Safety/Growing or High Crime Rate’ was selected by 382 total survey respondents or by 30.6 percent. A total of 355 survey respondents, or 28.5 percent, selected ‘Community is Developing Too Quickly/Too Much Building and/or Urban-Suburban Sprawl’ and 324 total survey respondents, or 26.0 percent, selected ‘Growing Levels of Illicit and Illegal Drug Use/Addiction’.

Figure 2.4 presents a word cloud summarizing the written in responses provided by survey respondents for ‘Other, Please Specify:’ for Question No. 10, “Which of the following attributes of your community do you think the tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritage industries have negatively contributed to your community? Select all that apply.” for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey.

Of the 158 total survey respondents that selected ‘Other, Please Specify:’ as part of their response to Question No. 10 and wrote in a response, survey respondents indicated a general split in assessing either the positive or negative impacts that the tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritage industries have had on their community. Similar to responses to other questions as part of this statewide Resident Sentiment Survey, several survey respondents noted that the tourism and hospitality industry sector has had a more direct negative impact on their community while the arts and cultural heritage industries have had a more direct positive impact on various attributes of their community. Survey respondents noted that the relatively low pay and low skill employment opportunities found throughout much of the tourism and hospitality industry sector has made it increasingly difficult for individuals working in this sector to secure affordable and quality housing, needed childcare services, and healthcare services, a sentiment not shared

Among the 368 total survey respondents that responded to Question No. 12 and wrote in a response, similar ‘negative experiences’ with the tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritages industries were reported, aligning with those identified in responses to other questions in the Resident Sentiment Survey. Survey respondents again, as part of their responses to Question No. 12, identified a growing lack of available and attainable housing, increased congestion and traffic on local area surface roadways and transportation networks, and rising concerns over criminal activity and homelessness in their community, mostly associated with the tourism and hospitality industry sector and less associated with the arts and cultural heritage industries. Several survey respondents, regarding their concerns over rising owner-occupied and renter-occupied housing costs and declining availability, shared several personal stories regarding their own difficulties, noting their own personal and household income levels have failed to keep pace with the rising costs of owner-occupied and renter-occupied housing in their communities. Survey respondents further noted that they believe wages and incomes paid by private sector businesses in the tourism and hospitality industry sector specifically are insufficient to ensure that individuals and households can ‘keep up’ with the growing cost of living and other related inflationary pressures in their community.

Increased traffic congestion on local area surface roadways and transportation networks and a lack of supporting infrastructure, including the availability of parking in predominantly tourist and visitor areas and adequate public transportation alternatives, were also identified by several survey respondents as part of their responses to Question No. 12. Survey respondents noted that surface roadways in their community, ranging from neighborhood surface streets to arterial connectors to major highways and Interstates, have become increasingly congested, especially during ‘peak’ tourist and visitor seasons. This has led to dramatic increases in overall commute times that area residents face daily, contributing to a noticeable decline in the overall quality of life of area residents. Increased traffic congestion on local area surface roadways and transportation networks has been most notable in and around the existing downtown commercial cores and entertainment districts of the communities of survey respondents. Several survey respondents that live near or close by major outdoor recreation destinations in the state further noted that increased tourist, visitor, and outdoor recreation enthusiast usage of these outdoor recreation destinations have also contributed to major traffic congestion concerns, making it increasingly difficult for local area residents to access and use these assets for personal recreation.

In and around existing downtown commercial cores and entertainment districts, in both the more urban and metropolitan communities and even in more rural non-metropolitan communities across the state, increased tourism and visitor counts have led to a noticeable decrease in the availability of parking, either surface parking or structured parking. Coupled with a lack of effective public transportation alternatives, survey respondents noted that area residents are starting to increasingly avoid visiting businesses and other locations in these existing downtown commercial cores and entertainment districts, having a ‘chilling affect’ on local area resident patronage of locally owned and operated businesses with locations in these existing downtown commercial cores and entertainment districts and on other key amenities and critically important services that local area residents depend upon. For example, several survey respondents noted that many of the local government offices and services, and even state government and some federal government services, that local area residents depend upon are in these existing

downtown commercial cores and entertainment districts alongside major tourist and visitor attractions including major hotel and casino resort properties. Increased vehicle traffic in these areas has made it difficult for local area residents to travel to government offices in these areas, including city halls, county government office buildings, municipal and county courthouses, post offices, and even various state and federal government offices. Survey respondents also noted that many of their community's arts and cultural heritage amenities and facilities are also co-located in these downtown commercial cores and entertainment districts. Facilities such as public libraries, community centers, museums, and galleries are also becoming increasingly difficult to access due to increased traffic congestion in these areas.

Another common and shared response among survey respondents as part of their overall responses to Question No. 12 was growing concern over perceived increases in criminal activity and homelessness in areas that predominately serve tourist and visitor needs and wants. Again, perceived increases in general levels of criminal activity and homelessness as a personal negative experience that survey respondents have experienced as part of their personal interaction with the tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritage industries seem to mostly be associated with the tourism and hospitality industry sector and less associated with the arts and cultural heritage industries. Without providing too many specific details, survey respondents noted that they had personally been a victim of some type of criminal activity in those parts of their community that are most associated with tourism and hospitality. However, the survey respondents did not qualify whether the perpetrator of these criminal activities was a tourist or visitor or whether the perpetrator was a local area resident. Homelessness and panhandling were additional negative concerns and experiences associated more with tourism and hospitality than with arts and cultural heritage as identified by survey respondents. Several survey respondents noted that they have increasingly avoided those parts of their community most associated with tourism and hospitality, typically their community's own existing downtown commercial core and/or entertainment district, because of increased homelessness and 'aggressive panhandling'. Again, both the perceived increase of criminal activity and increased homelessness and aggressive panhandling in these areas tend to make it increasingly difficult for local area residents to patronage locally owned and operated businesses in these areas, various government offices, and even museums, community centers, public libraries, and art galleries that showcase local artists and performers.

Table 2.9 presents the results for Question No. 13, "On a scale of 1 to 10 with 1 being "Very Poor" and 10 being "Excellent", how would you rank your overall personal assessment of local tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritage opportunities in your community:", for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey.

For 'Tourism and Hospitality Attractions (hotels, casinos, special events, convention facilities, etc.)', the average score was 6.47 with 220 total survey respondents, or 15.2 percent of the 1,444 that ranked this category, selecting 10 or Excellent, 116 total survey respondents or 8.0 percent selecting 9, and 257 total survey respondents or 17.8 percent selecting 8. The category, 'Outdoor Recreation Opportunities (trails, parks, non-professional sports facilities, etc.)' received an average score of 7.41 with 315 total survey respondents, or 21.8 percent of the 1,448 survey respondents that ranked this category, selecting 10 or Excellent, 226 total survey respondents or 15.6 percent selected 9, and 325 total survey respondents or 22.4 percent selecting 8. For

‘Overall Art Community (music concerts/festivals, art galleries, art museums, public art, visual/performance literary experiences, etc.)’, the average score was 6.17 with 116 total survey respondents, or 8.1 percent of the 1,432 survey respondents that ranked this category, selecting 10 or Excellent, 129 total survey respondents or 9.0 percent selecting 9, and 297 total survey respondents or 20.7 percent selecting 8.

The category, ‘Overall History and Heritage Community (including marked historical sites, history museums, etc.)’ received an average score of 6.12 with 129 total survey respondents, or 9.0 percent of the 1,433 survey respondents that ranked this category, selecting 10 or Excellent, 97 total survey respondents or 6.8 percent selected 9, and 254 total survey respondents or 17.7 percent selecting 8. For ‘Live Sporting Events (youth sports, collegiate sports, professional sports, etc.)’, the average score was 5.82 with 141 total survey respondents, or 10.1 percent of the 1,397 survey respondents that ranked this category, selecting 10 or Excellent, 99 total survey respondents or 7.1 percent selecting 9, and 214 total survey respondents or 15.3 percent selecting 8.

Table 2.10 presents the results for Question No. 14, “Tourism, hospitality, arts, and culture can have both positive and negative impacts on a community. These activities can create employment opportunities, result in increased business for directly and indirectly related businesses, and generate additional property, sales, and business license revenue for a community (in 2023, visitors to Nevada generated a total economic impact of \$83.7 billion). But, they can also lead to increased traffic, increased noise, negative impacts on natural resources, and require increased spending on public services. With these and other possible impacts in

For the statement, ‘The positive effects of tourism and hospitality outweigh the negatives.’, 258 total survey respondents, or 17.8 percent of the 1,449 survey respondents that evaluated this statement, selected Strongly Agree, 442 total survey respondents or 30.5 percent selected Agree, and 285 total survey respondents or 19.7 percent selected Mildly Agree. An additional 239 total survey respondents or 16.5 percent selected Neutral, 90 total survey respondents or 6.2 percent selected Mildly Disagree, 77 total survey respondents or 5.3 percent selected Disagree, and just 58 total survey respondents or 4.0 percent selected Strongly Disagree. For the statement, ‘The positive effects of arts and creativity outweigh the potential negative impacts in my community.’ as part of Question No. 14, 391 total survey respondents, or 27.0 percent of the 1,448 survey respondents that evaluated this statement, selected Strongly Agree, 444 total survey respondents or 30.7 percent selected Agree, and 205 total survey respondents or 14.2 percent selected Mildly Agree, while 245 total survey respondents or 16.9 percent selected Neutral. An additional 64 total survey respondents or 4.4 percent selected Mildly Disagree, 57 total survey respondents or 3.9 percent selected Disagree, and just 42 total survey respondents or 2.9 percent selected Strongly Disagree.

A total of 443 survey respondents, or 30.6 percent of the 1,448 survey respondents that evaluated the statement, ‘The positive effects of history and heritage preservation outweigh the potential negative impacts in my community.’ as part of Question No. 14, selected Strongly Agree, 452 total survey respondents or 31.2 percent selected Agree, and 201 total survey respondents or 13.9 percent selected Mildly Agree, while 213 total survey respondents or 14.7 percent selected Neutral. An additional 62 total survey respondents or 4.3 percent selected Mildly Disagree, 48 total survey respondents or 3.3 percent selected Disagree, and just 29 total survey respondents or 2.0 percent selected Strongly Disagree.

Table 2.11 presents the results for Question No. 15, “Please rank each of the following statements on a scale from Strongly Disagree to Strongly Agree.”, for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey. The top two rankings selected by survey respondents for each statement are highlighted.

For the statement, ‘I am proud to live in Nevada.’, the top two responses selected by survey respondents were Strongly Agree, selected by 629 total survey respondents or by 43.7 percent of the 1,439 survey respondents that evaluated this statement, and Agree, selected by 446 total survey respondents or by 31.0 percent. The top two responses selected by survey respondents for the statement, ‘The tourism, hospitality, arts, and cultural heritage industry in my local area enhances the community’s overall quality of life.’, were Agree, selected by 464 total survey respondents or by 32.1 percent of the 1,446 survey respondents that evaluated this statement, and Strongly Agree, selected by 320 total survey respondents or by 22.1 percent. For the statement, ‘Tourism creates jobs for people who live in my community.’, the top two responses selected by survey respondents were Agree, selected by 469 total survey respondents or by 32.4 percent of

The average score for the ranking provided by survey respondents for Question No. 16 was an estimated 0.26, indicating a strong balance between their community being ‘resident-focused’ and their community being ‘tourism-focused’ with a slight skew toward being more ‘tourism-focused’ in the present. The largest number of survey respondents, 333 total survey respondents or 23.4 percent of the 1,423 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 16, selected ‘0’ as part of their response. An additional 1,065 total survey respondents or 82.8 percent selected ‘Bicycling, Gravel Biking’, 1,043 total survey respondents or 81.8 percent selected ‘Snow Shoeing, etc.’, 996 total survey respondents or 77.8 percent selected ‘Organized Sports’, and 983 total survey respondents or 74.4 percent selected ‘Bicycling, Mountain Biking’. The eighth least popular activity selected by survey respondents as part of their response to Question No. 19 was ‘Other Winter Snow Sports (Sledding, Snowmobiling, etc.)’, selected by 969 total survey respondents or by 75.1 percent.

Of the 27 separate individual activities listed as part of Question No. 19, ‘2 to 4 Times Per Year’ was the most frequent response selected by most survey respondents. Survey respondents selected ‘2 to 4 Times Per Year’ for 25 of the 27 individual activities listed as part of Question No. 19, indicating fairly frequent engagement in a wide variety of outdoor recreation activities on public lands located throughout the state of Nevada. A total of ten additional individual activities listed as part of Question No. 19 had ‘5 to 7 Times Per Year’ selected as a top response by survey respondents with an additional ten additional activities listed had ‘21 or More Times Per Year’ selected by survey respondents. The individual activities evaluated by survey respondents where ‘21 or More Times Per Year’ was selected as either the most or second most frequently engaged in activity on public lands located throughout the state of Nevada included Astronomy, Stargazing (108 total survey respondents indicated that they engaged in this activity 21 or More Times Per Year in the past year), Bicycling, Mountain Biking (73 total survey respondents), Bicycling, Road Cycling (78 total survey respondents), General Fitness/Exercise (539 total survey respondents), Hiking (269 total survey respondents), Jogging/Running (130 total survey respondents), Outdoor Photography, Painting, Drawing (150 total survey respondents), Organized Sports (65 total survey respondents), Walking (642 total survey respondents), and Wildlife Viewing/Birdwatching (232 total survey respondents).

Figure 2.6 presents a word cloud summarizing the written in responses provided by survey respondents for ‘Other, Please Specify:’ for Question No. 19, “Over the past year, please indicate whether or not you have used designated public lands in Nevada for engagement in the specific outdoor recreation activities listed and the approximate number of individual times you have engaged in each activity over the past year.” for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey.

As part of Question No. 19, survey respondents were asked to indicate what other outdoor recreation activities that they have engaged in over the past year on public lands in Nevada. Of the 124 total survey respondents that wrote in a different type of outdoor recreation activity, most of these survey respondents listed similar activities to what was provided as part of Question No. 19 with some notable additions including golf, geocaching, wildlife viewing, wild flower and other plant viewing and discovery, target shooting, backcountry downhill land cross country skiing, and visiting sites located on public lands throughout the state of Nevada with unique and important cultural and/or historic meaning and history. Survey respondents also highlighted their use of various official state and national parks. Several survey respondents noted that they appreciate living relatively close to an official state and/or national park and noted their personal support for increased investment in these parks in-terms of improving overall accessibility, developing additional supportive infrastructure, and developing additional amenities that would increase the overall usage of these state and/or national parks. While improved accessibility to various state and/or national parks was noted by several survey respondents, survey respondents were also quick to note that increased accessibility must be balanced with ensuring that these various state and/or national parks are protected from over usage and deterioration.

Survey respondents also noted the need for more ‘organized’ activities on public lands, again balancing the need and desire to see more organized activities with preservation and conservation of these public lands. Of those survey respondents that wrote in a response to Question No. 19, several indicated that they would like to see the development of additional

residents and serve a broader demographic range including families with young children, teenagers, and even young adults. This desire extended beyond the development of and investment in new facilities and included the development of new activities and special events that are oriented toward local area and regional residents. Multi-cultural art and food festivals that celebrate local artists and cuisine, concerts that provide local performers with a venue to perform, and other special activities and special events were suggested by several survey respondents as part of their responses to Question No. 20.

One specific area that survey respondents highlighted as part of their answers to Question No. 20 included additional investment in celebrating, highlighting, preserving, and promoting local and regional Nevada Native American, Tribal, and Indigenous communities and their unique culture, heritage, and history. Additional Native American cultural centers, museums, art galleries, and interpretative and language centers, adventures, excursions, and tours, and Native American oriented activities, special events, dancing, art, food, and teachings were also highlighted by several survey respondents as a specific area where additional investment in new programs, projects, and initiatives should be made by local area and regional Tribal governments, local municipal and county governments, and by different state and federal government agencies. Investment in and development of these types of programs, projects, and initiatives will have to be balanced with the need to preserve and protect Native American communities and colony, reservation, and trust lands from over development and the threat that too much increased tourism and visitation to Indigenous and Tribal lands within the state could pose. Again, orienting these efforts toward serving existing local area and regional resident needs and wants, which includes existing residents of these Indigenous and Tribal lands within the state, could ensure the preservation and protection of the natural lands and these communities located within existing Nevada Native American and federally recognized Indigenous and Tribal colonies, reservations, and trust land.

Figure 2.8 presents a word cloud summarizing the written in responses provided by survey respondents for Question No. 21, “Using the space provided below, please provide any additional comments, concerns, or suggestions that you have regarding the broader Tourism and Hospitality industry sector in Nevada or in your local community.” for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey.

Again, like other responses provided by survey respondents to other questions part of this 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey, a significant number of the 460 total survey respondents that answered Question No. 21 expressed their concern that continued focus on expanding the broader tourism and hospitality industry sector in their community and region has created significant public safety concerns and has been pursued at the expense of existing local area and regional residents. Survey respondents echoed several concerns regarding increased tourism and visitation in their communities, including increased traffic congestion on area surface streets and local and regional highways and Interstates, the need for additional emergency medical, police, and fire protection services, increased frequency of homelessness and aggressive panhandling in these existing downtown commercial cores and entertainment districts, and a growing lack of public parking in these areas that can be used by local area and regional residents. Several survey respondents went as far to suggest that efforts to increase tourism and visitation to their community and region, including usage of various

outdoor recreation assets and spaces, be limited in favor of new programs, projects, and initiatives that are designed to serve community and regional resident needs and wants, especially for certain underserved demographic groups such as families with young children, teenagers, and young adults.

Several survey respondents did note that the tourism and hospitality industry sector is a vital driver of local economic activity and that the industry generates needed public tax revenues, creates employment opportunities for local area and regional residents, and, to a degree, does support small to medium-sized businesses, especially those small to medium-sized businesses that are co-located with major tourism and hospitality oriented operations in existing downtown cores, entertainment districts, and main street corridors. While survey respondents generally did indicate that tourism and hospitality, including continued advertisement and promotion of outdoor recreation assets, activities, and opportunities, is vitally important to the their community’s and region’s overall economic growth and health, several survey respondents noted a desire to see more focus on diversification of the tourism and hospitality industry sector in ways that better balance meeting the needs and wants of tourists and visitors with the needs and wants of local area and regional residents. Part of this effort should include increased investment, by both the public sector and by the private sector, in critical public infrastructure and public services that mitigate the potential negative impacts of increased tourist and visitor

traffic and part of this effort should also include the development, implementation, and completion of new programs, projects, and initiatives, including new special events and activities, that appeal to both tourists and visitors and to local area and regional residents.

2.3 Personal Engagement and Interaction with Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Activities Results

Respondents to Question No. 23 indicated generally low levels of annual spending on attending various arts and/or cultural activities, amenities, or experiences in their local community over the past year. A total of 525 survey respondents, or 38.7 percent of the 1,357 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 23, selected ‘Between \$100.00 and \$499.00’ as part of their answer to this question and 303 total survey respondents, or 22.3 percent, selected ‘Less than \$100.00’. An additional 257 total survey respondents or 18.9 percent selected ‘Between \$500.00 and \$999.00’, 143 total survey respondents or 10.5 percent selected ‘Between \$1,000.00 and \$1,999.00’, and 96 total survey respondents or 7.1 percent selected ‘Between \$2,000.00 and \$4,999.00’. Just 24 total survey respondents or 1.8 percent of the 1,357 survey respondents that

responded to Question No. 23 selected ‘Between \$5,000.00 and \$9,999.00’ and even fewer survey respondents, just nine total survey respondents or 0.7 percent, selected ‘\$10,000.00 or More’.

For the Nevada State Museum (Carson City), a majority of the 1,296 survey respondents that responded to this question and to this specific facility and location, 869 total survey respondents

or 67.1 percent, answered ‘No’, indicating that they had not visited this facility and/or location within the past year while 427 total survey respondents or 33.0 percent answered ‘Yes’, indicating that they had visited this facility and/or location within the past year. A total of 1,093 total survey respondents, or 85.3 percent of the 1,281 survey respondents that responded to this facility and/or location, answered ‘No’ for the Nevada State Museum (Las Vegas) while just 188 total survey respondents, or 14.7 percent, answered ‘Yes’.

For the Nevada State Railroad Museum (Carson City), 901 total survey respondents or 85.3 percent of 1,284 survey respondents answered ‘No’ while 383 total survey respondents or 29.8 percent answered Yes and, for the Nevada State Railroad Museum (Boulder City), 1,109 total survey respondents or 87.0 percent of 1,275 survey respondents answered ‘No’ while just 166 total survey respondents or 13.0 percent answered ‘Yes’. An additional 1,101 total survey respondents, or 86.3 percent of 1,276 survey respondents, answered ‘No’ for the East Ely Railroad Depot Museum (Ely) while 175 total survey respondents, or 13.7 percent, answered ‘Yes’. The majority of all survey respondents that responded to Question No. 25 all indicated that they do not plan on visiting any of the seven individual facilities and/or locations listed as part of this question. For the Nevada State Museum (Carson City), a majority of survey respondents, 705 total survey respondents or 55.0 percent, selected ‘No’ while 576 total survey respondents or 45.0 percent selected ‘Yes’, indicating that they do plan on visiting this facility and/or location within the next year. For the Nevada State Museum (Las Vegas), 928 total survey respondents

or 74.2 percent selected ‘No’ while just 322 total survey respondents or 25.8 percent selected ‘Yes’ and, for the Nevada State Railroad Museum (Carson City), 742 total survey respondents or 58.7 percent selected ‘No’ while 522 total survey respondents or 41.3 percent selected ‘Yes’.

For the Nevada State Railroad Museum (Boulder City), 978 total survey respondents, or 78.3 percent, selected ‘No’ while 271 total survey respondents, or 21.7 percent, selected ‘Yes’ and, for the East Ely Railroad Depot Museum (Ely), 1,012 total survey respondents, or 81.2 percent, selected ‘No’ while just 235 total survey respondents, or 18.9 percent, selected ‘Yes’. An additional 1,028 total survey respondents, or 82.4 percent, selected ‘No’ for the Lost City Museum (Overton), indicating that they do not plan on visiting this facility and/or location within the next year, while just 220 total survey respondents, or 17.6 percent, selected ‘Yes’, indicating that they do plan on visiting the Lost City Museum (Overton) within the next year. Finally, for the Nevada Historical Society (Reno), 862 total survey respondents or 67.9 percent selected ‘No’ and 407 total survey respondents or 32.1 percent selected ‘Yes’.

‘Not located near me.’ was the most common reason selected by survey respondents as to why they do not plan on visiting any of the state’s museums over the next year, selected by 953 total survey respondents or by 73.2 percent of the 1,302 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 26 while ‘I have already visited one of the Nevada State Museums.’ was selected by 325 total survey respondents or by 25.0 percent. ‘I was not aware of these Nevada State Museums.’ was selected by 188 total survey respondents or by 14.4 percent and ‘I do not think that there is anything new to see in these museums.’ was selected by 162 total survey respondents or by 12.4 percent. An additional 112 total survey respondents, or 8.6 percent, selected ‘I do not have the time to visit a museum.’ and 105 total survey respondents, or 8.1 percent, selected ‘I am not interested in visiting museums.’ as part of their response to Question No. 26. Just 50 total survey respondents, or 3.8 percent, selected ‘The cost of admission is too high.’ while 162 additional total survey respondents, or 12.4 percent, selected ‘Other, Please Specify:’ and provided a separate written answer.

Figure 2.9 presents a word cloud summarizing the written in responses provided by survey respondents for ‘Other, Please Specify:’ for Question No. 26, “If you answered “No” for any of the museums listed in Question No. 24, please indicate the reason why you do not plan on visiting any of these museums over the next year. Select all that apply.” for the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey.

A significant number of the 162 total survey respondents that selected ‘Other, Please Specify:’ as part of their response to Question No. 26 and provided a written reasons as to why they do not plan on visiting any of the seven state museums over the next year indicated that the cost associated with travel to these museums, in-terms of fuel, lodging, food and beverage purchased during the trip, and other related expenses is simply too high at this current time. As an alternative to visiting any of the seven state museums located throughout the state of Nevada, these survey respondents did indicate that they are more likely to visit other museums and cultural centers closer to where they live, especially those survey respondents living outside one of Nevada’s three metropolitan statistical areas and throughout the state’s more rural non-metropolitan areas. Survey respondents highlighted recent and planned visits to facilities such as the Churchill County Museum located in Fallon, Nevada, the Stewart Cultural Center located in Carson City, Nevada, the Hawthorne Ordnance Museum in Hawthorne, Nevada, or the Tonopah Historic Mining Park located in Tonopah, Nevada as alternatives to the state museums that are closer to where they currently live as viable alternatives. For those survey respondents living in the state’s more urban and metropolitan communities, survey respondents indicated that they have plans to visit other arts and cultural heritage facilities and locations in their community such as the Nevada Museum of Art in Reno, Nevada or The Mob Museum in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Other survey respondents who provided a written reason as to why they do not plan on visiting any of the seven state museums within the next year indicated that they are more interested in attending or visiting other arts and cultural heritage locations or plan on visiting one of Nevada’s various state parks. Attending and participating in different special events, concerts, theater and dance performances, and other live performances and activities were also identified by several survey respondents as to why they do not plan on visiting any of the seven listed state museums within the next year. Related to the cost associated with travel to and visitation of these

For the statement, ‘Additional funding should be allocated to the Nevada Division of Tourism (Travel Nevada).’, 336 total survey respondents or 25.0 percent of the 1,344 survey respondents that evaluated this statement selected ‘Neutral’ and 320 total survey respondents or 23.8 percent selected ‘Agree’. ‘Mildly Agree’ was selected by 284 total survey respondents or by 21.1 percent, ‘Strongly Agree’ was selected by 211 total survey respondents or by 15.7 percent, and 70 total survey respondents or 5.2 percent selected ‘Disagree’. Just 63 total survey respondents, or 4.7 percent, selected ‘Strongly Agree’ while just 60 total survey respondents, or 4.5 percent, selected ‘Mildly Disagree’.

For the statement, ‘Additional funding should be allocated to the Nevada Division of Museums and History.’ 344 total survey respondents or 25.6 percent of the 1,344 survey respondents that evaluated this statement selected ‘Agree’ and 298 total survey respondents or 22.2 percent selected ‘Neutral’. An additional 289 total survey respondents or 21.5 percent selected ‘Strongly Agree’, 286 total survey respondents or 21.3 percent selected ‘Mildly Agree’, while 46 total survey respondents or 3.4 percent selected ‘Mildly Disagree’. A significant majority of survey respondents, 1,108 total survey respondents or 83.1 percent, selected ‘Yes’ for the Nevada Division of Tourism (Travel Nevada) while just 225 total survey respondents or 16.9 percent selected ‘No’. A

smaller majority of survey respondents, 822 total survey respondents or 61.8 percent, selected ‘Yes’ for the Nevada Arts Council while 508 total survey respondents or 38.2 percent selected ‘No’ as part of their response for this division.

The single largest age group selected by survey respondents was ‘Between 60 to 64 Years of Age’, selected by 171 total survey respondents or by 12.6 percent of the 1,354 survey respondents that responded to Question No. 31. ‘Between 55 to 59 Years of Age’ was selected by 162 total survey respondents or by 12.0 percent, ‘Between 50 to 54 Years of Age’ was selected by 155 total survey respondents or by 11.5 percent, and ‘Between 65 to 69 Years of Age’ was selected by 145 total survey respondents or by 10.7 percent. An additional 139 total survey respondents, or 10.3 percent, selected ‘Between 40 to 44 Years of Age’.

Comparatively, in 2023 and according to the U.S. Census Bureau, the annual median age for the entire state of Nevada was an estimated 38.9 years of age. Based on the results to Question No. 32 as part of the 2025 Nevada Tourism, Hospitality, Arts, and Culture Resident Sentiment Survey, an estimated 0.47 people aged Between 13 and 17 Years of Age are living in their household, 0.53 people aged Between 18 and 24 Years of Age are living in their household, and 0.66 people aged Between 25 and 34 Years of Age living in their household. An additional 336 total survey respondents or 24.8 percent selected ‘Retired’, 69 total survey respondents, or 5.1 percent, selected ‘Self-employed, full-time (36 hours a week or more)’, and 59 total survey respondents, or 4.4 percent, selected ‘Employed, part-time (less than 36 hours a week)’. The largest number of survey respondents, 458 total survey respondents or 34.2 percent of the 1,339 survey respondents that answered Question No. 36, selected ‘Bachelor’s Degree, Graduated’, followed by ‘Master’s Degree, Graduated’, selected by 275 total survey respondents or by 20.5 percent, and then by ‘Some College, No Degree’, selected by 265 total survey respondents or by 19.8 percent. An additional 141 total survey respondents or 10.5 percent selected ‘Associates Degree, Graduated’, ‘High School Diploma or GED’ was selected by 73 total survey respondents or by 5.5 percent, and ‘PhD, Doctorate, or Equivalent, Graduated’ was selected by 59 total survey respondents or by 4.4 percent. Just 24 total survey respondents, or 1.8 percent, selected ‘Post-Graduate Degree, Graduated/Completed’ and only one survey respondent, or 0.1 percent of survey respondents that responded to Question No. 36, selected ‘Less than High School’.

Comparatively, and according to the U.S. Census Bureau, an estimated 26.2 percent of the state of Nevada’s total population aged 25 years of age or older attained High School Graduate (includes equivalency) in 2023, followed by 21.3 percent of the state’s total population aged 25 years of age or older who attained a Bachelor’s Degree, and 19.4 percent of the state’s total population aged 25 years of age or older with Some College, No Degree. In 2023, an additional 13.7 percent of Nevada’s total population aged 25 years of age or older had a Graduate or Professional Degree, 8.8 percent had an Associate’s Degree, followed by 5.9 percent with some 9th to 12th Grade Education with No Diploma, and 4.7 percent with Less than 9th Grade Education.

Of the 1,307 survey respondents that answered Question No. 37, a significant majority, 1,075 total survey respondents or 82.3 percent, selected ‘White/Caucasian Alone’, followed by ‘Hispanic/Latino’, selected by 140 total survey respondents or by 10.7 percent, and by ‘Asian or Pacific Islander’, selected by 66 total survey respondents or by 5.1 percent. An additional 48 total survey respondents, or 3.7 percent, selected ‘American Indian, Alaskan Native/Aleut Eskimo’ and an additional 33 total survey respondents, or 2.5 percent, selected ‘Black/African American’. A total of 61 survey respondents, or 4.7 percent of those survey respondents that answered Question No. 37, selected ‘Other, Please Specify:’. In 2023, and according to the U.S. Census Bureau, approximately 46.0 percent of the state of Nevada’s total population was White,

followed by Hispanic or Latino accounting for 29.2 percent of the statewide total population, Black or African American Alone accounting for 9.1 percent, and Asian Alone accounting for 8.5 percent. Two or More Races accounted for approximately 5.4 percent of the state of Nevada’s statewide total population in 2023, followed by Native American and Other Pacific Islander Alone accounting for 0.7 percent, American Indian and Alaska Native Alone accounting for 0.6 percent, and Some Other Race Alone accounting for 0.5 percent.

Survey respondents were largely evenly divided into Democrat, Republican, and Independent based on the results for Question No. 38. Of the 1,285 survey respondents that answered Question No. 38, 385 total survey respondents or 30.0 percent selected ‘Democrat’, 379 total survey respondents or 29.5 percent selected ‘Republican’, and 345 total survey respondents or 26.9 percent selected ‘Independent’.
